All students' records from admission to examination are maintained. Students' data( classwise, subject wise, categorywise) can be generated. Learning certificates for free bus pass scheme, Bona fide certificates, Character Certificates and Transfer Certificates are issued through the MIS data. The system is used for generating fee receipts (studentwise, headwise, datewise) admission fee summary report. Information of students with/without fees concession can be generated. Employees' records in form of biometrics attendance are stored. MIS has reduced the workload on the administrative staff by providing quick access to data on any student or a group of students which can be filtered and arranged according to requirement with a few clicks. Apart from this it gives exact status of admitted and vacant seats of any class. Using Tally 7.2, all accounting data is stored and generated. Using Lib. Software, the library is fully automated. Barcode system is also available. The library staff issue books, journals, periodicals and provide access to electronic resources to the students, faculty and staff members.</p>

Student mentoring system is functional in the institution. Teacher mentors take the responsibility of students. The mechanism is that course wise and class wise student list is distributed to the mentorteachers. A printed list of students with address and phone numbers is given to the mentors. Many of the students come from rural and economically backward families. Especially female students face social problems. So mentors ask individual and try to solve their problems. Some of the admitted have parents who do not wish to send them to the college regularly due to financial constraints. The mentors encourage girl students and parents and convince them to send their wards to college regularly. Mentors personally call them and give information about examination and scholarship. Maximum students come from the rural areas, travelling by the state government buses to college. Many a times, they are not able to afford travel fare. Mentors personally support them sometimes also financially.

Pallavi Damodar successfully worked as a junior under officer in the session 201819. 4) The participation of girls is increasing in different activities and programmes and they anchor and lead various programmes. 5) Participation of girls in various activities of the students is good. Problems Encountered and Resources Required : 1) Though the girl students' participation has increased, families of girls sometimes do not allow their participation in activities, especially off campus ones.

### 7.3 – Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 – Provide the details of the performance of the institution in one area distinctive to its vision, priority and thrust in not more than 500 words

The vision of the institute emphasizes on employability skills. The institute which started as an aided single faculty college in the Arts stream, organized activities focusing on entry into services. Buldana is a socially and economically backward district with agriculture as the main occupation (mostly dependant on rains). A number of the rural young were keen to start earning early to augment their family incomes rather than complete their UG education. Many were employed as unskilled workers in automobile hubs at Pune and Aurangabad. Thus, when skillbased degree programmes were introduced by the University Grants Commission, we readily applied. Our college was the first one to begin skill based degree programmes under our affiliating university. Although the college had no existing infrastructure or expertise in the automobile sector, the observation that youth of the region work in the auto sector, prompted the institute to apply. The college started with two degree programmes, B.Voc. (Vehicle Testing) and B.Voc. (Farm Equipment and Machinery). Implementation: A fullfledged cutsection workshop, an assembling and dismantling workshop, a vehicle testing laboratory and tools ensured proper implementation of the practical component of the Vocational Courses. MoUs with authorized automobile workshops provided handson training to students. Students also benefit immensely from training courses (2 to 6 weeks) at the Central Government Institute, Central Farm Machinery Training and Testing Institute(CFMTTI), Budhni, M.P. CFMTTI also organizes needbased courses for our students apart from their training calendar. Most of our students have been placed at authorized workshops and a few have started their own ventures. The college is in dialogue with the Automobile Skills Development Council for spreading awareness regarding the new vocational programmes among prospective

employers so as to ensure fruitful placements. Encouraged by the response to the Vehicle Testing Course, B.Voc.(Engine Testing) was started in 201819. Also, looking at the fast growing retail sector, B.Voc.(Retail Management) was also started in 201819. Though the vocational degree programmes are new and different from the traditional courses in teaching and assessment structure, we hope they will be helpful in bridging the skill gap requirements of the employers.
